Any allergies and sensitivities you have

4 Other therapies you use

Problems or concerns you have with your medicine

Anything that may affect your ability to use the medication

Your Role in Safe Medication

When it comes to using medicine, there is no such thing as completely safe. All medications have risks. By being involved in your health care, you can decrease the risks and get the most benefits from your medication.





Report to the Care Team

Pay attention to how you feel and notify your doctor or nurse of any problems. If you have doubts that the medication is working effectively, do not stop taking it without checking with the nurse. Some medications take longer to show a benefit, and some need to be withdrawn gradually to decrease undesirable effects. If you experience a side effect, let your nurse know immediately. An adjustment in the dosage or a change in medication may be needed.



You are the Center of the Care Team





Your health care team members help you make the best-informed choices, but your job is to participate in decisions about your treatment and medications.


You are the center of the health care team. When you meet with a team member, ask questions if you have them.



Ask a family member or friend to help you understand your questions and remember the answers.

Pay Attention to the Medications You or Your Loved One are Receiving

Make sure you are getting the right medication, at the right time, by the right person. Medication errors are unintended outcomes that can result in harm. Everyone has a role in ensuring safe medication use, including residents and families. It is the Park Place policy that no medications, (including tylenol, vitamins, antacids, laxatives and creams) are to be kept at the bedside.
