1

DIRECT CONTACT
Body surface to body surface

2

INDIRECT CONTACT
Body surface contact with a contaminated object

3

DROPLET CONTACT
Droplets containing microorganisms, from an infected person are propelled through the air

4

AIRBORNE CONTACT
Airborne droplets containing microorganisms evaporate and remain suspended in the air

5

COMMON VEHICLE TRANSFER
Common vehicle transfer occurs through contaminated items such as food, water, medications and equipment

Routine Practices

Routine practices are designed to reduce the risk of infection. These practices are used when handling all blood or body fluids and secretions. Routine practices include:

- Hand washing and alcohol-based hand rubs
- The use of gowns, gloves and face protection
- Disinfection of equipment and or contaminated surfaces

The risk of becoming infected depends on your health; older people tend to be more vulnerable to infection. Everyone (all staff, residents, families and visitors) have a role in preventing and controlling infections. In order to prevent the spread of germs in the care home we ask that your friends and family not visit you if they are suffering from any infectious illness until they are well. This may include but is not limited to:

- Cough
- Cold or sore throat
- Flu like symptoms
- Diarrhea

Protect Yourself

The most important thing we can do is wash our hands. Staff members wash their hands with soap and water both before and after contact with you or they use an alcohol-based hand cleaner. If you are not certain they have cleaned their hands, please ask them to do so.



We encourage you to wash your hands or use the hand cleaner located near or in your room.



Cough Etiquette

The most important thing we can do is wash our hands. Staff members wash their hands with soap and water both before and after contact with you or they use an alcohol-based hand cleaner. If you are not certain they have cleaned their hands, please ask them to do so.

- Covering your nose and mouth with disposable tissues when coughing, sneezing, wiping and blowing your nose
- Disposing of tissues in the nearest garbage pail after use
- Coughing or sneezing into your inner elbow rather than your hand if no tissues are available
- Keeping contaminated hands away from your eyes and nose
- Washing your hands after contact with respiratory secretions
